A DECADE of building financial strength now enables the modernisation of key spaces within Wellington Soldiers Memorial Club and the delivery of long-term community benefits as this club continues to grow alongside its members.

Following an in-depth review of the club's strengths and weaknesses through a Strategic Plan conducted by the club's board of directors with general manager Stephen Hodge, priorities were established including the adoption of the 'Looking to the Future' strategy which plans to

rejuvenate existing areas and modernise within to enhance an enjoyable customer experience while establishing a more family-friendly atmosphere.

Redevelopment has been aligned with financial viability and will be staged over the next several years.

Centre Spread Liftout

Inserted in today's edition is a four-page liftout detailing the Wellington Soldiers Memorial Club (WSMC) vision of proposed future designs of Gaming, Bar

Cost shifting now costing \$500 per ratepayer

Welcome back to 2026

I HOPE that everyone had a safe and restful Christmas and New Year, and is excited to see what 2026 brings.

It's obviously going to be another big year at Council as Councillors once again seek to 'do more with less' by continuing to provide the services without a big rate rise, whilst also having costs shifted onto us by the State and Federal Government.

The recent Local Government NSW survey of councils found that the Cost Shift from the other two tiers of government onto local councils is approaching \$500 per ratepayer.

This means that ratepayers through their Council are funding services that were previously fully provided by State and Federal Governments.

This is obviously financially unsustainable in the medium to long term, with many other councils in NSW looking to reduce service levels or apply a Special Rate Variation in some form.

(Another) Fire at a Solar Farm

Once again, a fire has started at a solar farm in our LGA.

These events are disturbing and worrying

for neighbouring landowners who could potentially be burnt out by a fast-moving grassfire. I have already written to relevant NSW Government Ministers before Christmas asking for a full investigation into the well-publicised Wellington North Solar Farm fire, but obviously haven't heard back yet due to the ongoing investigation and the holidays.

The community really does need some answers on the management practices, fire-fighting plans, and grass control strategies of solar farms, especially when they start incorporating large lithium Battery Energy Storage Systems into the projects.

Feral Deer

Imagine my surprise when I rounded a bend on the hill down into Moonbi, near Tamworth, and there were three Fallow Deer standing in the middle of the Oxley Highway like they owned the place.

That evening when driving between Mulla-ley and Coonabarabran I also saw a decent sized red doe on the side of the road.

Feral deer are going to be a massive problem for farmers and motorists in our part of the world in a few short years.

A comprehensive strategy is required from the NSW Government to control deer numbers before they explode to levels seen in the alpine regions of NSW and Victoria.

Roger Everett reflects on host of memories after reading the Walmer story in December

READING THE article from Kel Wykes written by Mrs Wykes from the Walmer Village shop (WDL December 18, 2025) brought back a host of memories to Roger Everett

The installation of the petrol bowser at the shop was a particular "masterpiece" for us pre-teens, where we watched the required fuel hand pumped up to the upper glass chamber and then run into a vehicle.

The pony rides from "Karoo" to the Wykes's shop and then the Post Office, run by Mrs Parkes at the time, was an adventure and to collect the fresh hi-top bread loaves from the mailbox on return was an absolute treat when we got back. Wonderful people in wonderful times.

Who could forget the truck lines, with their skewered hemp bags, at the wheat silo's that were a social get together, and good trading days for the shop.

Invariably the trucks were overloaded and had to be jacked up overnight to stop the springs inverting. Often kids were left to move the truck in the line whilst dad continued the harvest at home.

Hard work was what ensured survival.

Mrs Wykes's reference to the Baird Family at "Karoo" has a history of its own and started when Samual Lane and his 11-year-old nephew Frank Shepherd came to Australia on the advice of Samual's Doctor.

On the voyage they became friendly to Dr Stokes and Mr Basset who ventured on to Wellington with their families, whilst Samual was admitted to Bathurst Hospital to recover from a life-threatening

episode on the voyage.

After recovery he apparently worked for several years as the Bathurst Hospital Administrator and in good health he sent for his wife and young son Harold to join him.

The Lanes decided to visit the Stokes and Basset families in Wellington, and Dr Stokes offered to show them land for purchase in the "Bushranger infested Walmer Area" and they subsequently moved to "Happy Valley" and built a wattle and daub cottage and Samual created an "amazing English garden including fruit trees" that visitors reportedly admired.

On Sundays Samual made the trek to play the organ at the Curra Creek church and was apparently highly regarded for his advice.

The Lanes purchased "Old Karoo" and eventually lived in a quarried stone house much to the pleasure of Mrs Lane. The Lane-Shepherd partnership provided land for the School, formerly at Smokey Camp, adjacent to the village.

Douglas Baird the son of Presbyterian Minister from Exeter in NSW arrived on the scene and ultimately married the Lane's only daughter Olive Lindrea Lane.

Douglas and Olive took over the now substantial "Karoo" property and then their son Darvel took over the property with one daughter marrying Harold Morley and taking over a portion of "Karoo" adjacent to the village.

The Baird's other daughters including my mother Lucy Everett, all married locally.

The 11-year-old nephew of Frank

Shepherd ultimately purchased "Acton" in the Narromine district, and son Harold Lane married Elsie Stevenson from "Terrabella" and purchased "Goolbinga" ultimately part of "Redlands".

The Lanes owned significant residential and commercial real estate in Wellington and in subsequent times the Bairds owned a number of residential properties in Wellington.

Darvel Baird was very active in the Wellington community particularly Apex, and served as a Councillor and Shire President and his wife Muriel remained active on the retained portion of "Karoo" until her death a few years ago.

State records highest number of women murdered in domestic/family violence

NSW AGAIN records highest number of women murdered in a domestic and family violence context in 2025

Specialist DFV services report average waits of two-months for support. DEMAND FOR support to manage, leave and recover from domestic and family violence continues to rise.

With NSW once again recording the highest number of women killed in a domestic violence context in the country, Domestic Violence NSW said the failure of the NSW Government to invest in frontline services, many of which had not received an increase to their base operational funding in more than a decade, was placing lives at risk.

According to Domestic Violence NSW, the peak body for specialist domestic and family violence (DFV) services in the state, the NSW Government can no longer ignore calls for a 50 per cent increase to core funding for the DFV sector, as services are at crisis point and women and

children are being turned away from life-saving support.

DVNSW CEO Delia Donovan said the situation was untenable and required immediate government action.

"In early 2025, our members reported average wait times of up to two months for people seeking support," Ms Donovan said.

"This is essential work and for some women and children, it's the difference between life and death.

"Imagine the public outcry if there were a two-month wait to be treated in an Emergency Department.

"Where is that same urgency when women and children are trying to access safety?"

Specialist DFV workers report that many services are being kept afloat through unpaid overtime, fundraising, and staff covering basic costs out of their own pockets.

As referral rates continue to climb, DVNSW warns that goodwill is being relied on to prop up a sector stretched bey-

ond capacity.

"For more than five years, we have consistently called for a 50pc increase to baseline funding so frontline services can meet demand, retain skilled workers, and provide safety and healing to those in crisis," Ms Donovan said.

"This call is backed by researchers, experts, workers and victim-survivors – yet successive governments have failed to listen and act."

The crisis is even more severe in regional and remote NSW, where modelling shows some services require up to 8.94 times their current funding simply to remain operational.

"The data is clear and the solutions are known.

"What's missing is political will," she said.

"NSW is the wealthiest and most well-resourced states in the country, yet women and children are being forced to return to violence because we cannot commit just 0.1 per cent of the state budget to properly fund the services that save their lives."

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

Summer Safety: Be SunSmart

It's pretty well known that skin cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in Australia, but did you know that the sun's ultraviolet (UV) radiation can also cause premature ageing and eye damage?

The good news is you can lower your risk by being SunSmart. When the UV level is 3 or above, remember to be SunSmart by using all 5 sun protection measures, even if it's cloudy: SLIP on some sun-protective

clothing; SLOP on SPF50 or SPF50+ broad-spectrum and water-resistant sun-screen; SLAP on a broadbrimmed hat; SEEK shade; and SLIDE on some sunglasses.

Make sure to check your skin regularly for any new spots or changes in shape, colour or size of existing spots. If you notice anything unusual, see your doctor as soon as possible. Most skin cancers can be successfully treated if found early.

Specialist Menopause Service

When women experience severe or complex menopausal symptoms it can have a big impact on both their quality of life and health, including heart and bone related issues.

For these women, more expert advice, direction and treatment options from the NSW Specialist Menopause Service can help.

Women in the Western NSW Local Health District (WNSWLHD) may be eligible to access this service, if they meet one or more of the following eligibility criteria:

* Experience perimenopause/menopause

symptoms before the age of 40; or,

* Experience perimenopause/menopausal symptoms after the age of 40 but also have a history of any of the following medical conditions:

- * Cardiovascular (heart) disease or stroke
- * Venous Thromboembolism (VTE) or known thromboembolic disease
- * Cancer (current or past history or genetic risk of breast/gynaecological cancer)
- * Migraine with aura
- * Symptoms of menopause not improved 6-8 weeks after initiating therapy
- * Acute liver disease
- * High risk of fracture or history of minimal trauma fracture

The WNSWLHD Specialist Menopause Service is a referral service, with a care coordinator assessing and triaging patient referrals and helping patients to navigate care locally. The service also assists with additional referrals as needed, both locally and through the South-Western Sydney Local Health District (SWSLHD) Specialist Menopause Hub Service as part of NSW Health's state-wide Menopause Network.

General practitioners, medical specialists

and nurse practitioners can refer eligible women to the WNSWLHD Specialist Menopause Service for advanced care. If you're experiencing complex menopausal or perimenopausal symptoms, speak to your care provider to find out whether a referral is right for you.

Tertiary Student Scholarships

Students studying an accredited course through TAFE NSW, a Registered Training Organisation (RTO), University or a similar institution may be eligible to apply for financial assistance through OCTEC Limited's Glenn Taylor Scholarship.

Valued up to \$20,000, this opportunity is designed to alleviate financial hardship for regional and rural Australian students.

Those living with disability, First Nations people, mature-aged students heading back to school, and people who have excelled in their studies are encouraged to apply.

amalgamation," Ms Edwards said.

"The Board, like golf club members, believed the ongoing success for the golf club was essential to the benefit of the whole Wellington community.

"And trading and profitability has already increased."

Ms Edwards said she saw the golf club as a hidden gem with much potential.

"We now have plans to upgrade the clubhouse area which will result in attracting more community engagement, particularly in functions like wedding ceremonies and breakfasts, plus other celebrations as well as encouraging more family-oriented engagement."

WINS block

With the acquisition of the WINS block the Soldiers Club has reviewed its strategic plan to fulfil a long-time dream of developing a new bowling green facility at the rear of the club's premises.

"A bowling green will also offer members an additional sporting attraction," Ms Edwards said.

"The synthetic lawn rinks will be easy-care, and an opportunity to acknowledge local sporting and community members with the area and rinks named after them."

Keeping ahead with the times

WSMC general manager Stephen Hodge said that as the club's finances and savings were in a positive position, the club's financial viability and continued savings enabled modernisation of areas within.

"Some stabilising work by the club's previous general manager David French and club directors during the past 10 to 15 years has placed this club's finances into a very positive position which now enables a phase of restructuring to keep ahead of a challenging club business income future," Mr Hodge said.

"From the board's strategic plan the first three stages of modernising club areas have been identified and design plans are now ready to head to the regional council as development applications.

"The first stage is an upgrade enhancement of the gaming outdoor smoking area together with a new club bar arrangement availing easier service in keeping with member's needs.

"Following this will be a complete restructure of the kitchen area to include a multi-national cuisine Bistro enabling patrons to increase their dining experience by viewing their meals being cooked and prepared from their tables.

15 billion containers recycled in Return and Earn

NSW RECYCLERS have benefited from \$1.5 billion in refunds by returning a record 15 billion containers through Return and Earn.

Enthusiasm for Return and Earn has seen the tally of bottles, cartons and cans returned through the network soar from 14 billion to 15 billion containers in less than six months.

The estimated environmental benefits of the scheme, which launched in December 2017, include: energy savings equivalent to powering 204,750 homes for a year; water savings equivalent to 35,186 Olympic swimming pools; and CO2 emissions equivalent to taking nearly 1.1 million cars off the road for a year. The staggering 15 billion milestone has been reached as the state government prepares to expand the scheme

to accept wine and spirit bottles and larger drink containers from mid-2027. The scheme expansion will divert an estimated 27,000 tonnes of materials from NSW landfills annually, and make an additional 362 million containers eligible for the 10 cent refund each year.

Return and Earn was first introduced as a litter reduction initiative and has become an integral part of NSW's circular economy, with glass and plastic bottles processed and back on the shelves within weeks of being returned.

The program has also become a key fundraising platform for charities and community groups, with over \$91.5 million in container refund donations and fees from hosting return points to support worthy causes since 2017.

Looking to the future



AS the leading and largest venue in town, the Wellington Soldiers Memorial & Golf Group (WSMG) continues to play a very important role in the social fabric of the town and Wellington's surrounding region.

It is the primary place for people to meet and socialise, and this is especially true for the older members of the community who value the Club for its safety and friendly atmosphere.

But the club must keep up with the times and changes in the social fabric and to survive, it must expand its services to cater to the upcoming generations.

With this knowledge the club's Board of Directors worked with consultants for some months, starting in October 2024 to prepare its **Strategic Plan** for the future 10 years and beyond.

The Plan builds on past inhouse

improvements in the past 30 years and proposes to update the facilities while also broadening its scope to endure competition, and keep abreast and in front of potential financial impediments by expanding entrepreneurial assets.

These include investing in real estate in Wellington, and already has a solid portfolio of residential and commercial property which provides for strong diversification against the risk of gaming regulatory changes.

Immediate-past General Manager, David French worked hard for 15 years to bring the Club's finances into positive savings and handed over the role two years ago to current General Manager Stephen Hodge, saying he left a rough gem for Stephen to hone into a shining diamond.

The **Strategic Plan** was developed under Stephen's guidance together with further property acquisitions and the amalgamation of

this Club with Wellington Golf Club.

This move not only keeps one of the Central West's best golfing venues active, but has already turned profits around for the benefit of golfers, and WSMG members.

The recent acquisition of the WINS Community Centre and property is seen as a key addition to the club's portfolio and enables further expansion and the establishment of a three to four rink lawn bowling green.

When WINS found itself in financial difficulty this Club went to their assistance making sure this community did not lose a necessary vital link in assisting the people of this area.

Inside the Soldiers Club, we expand on plans which are now in place with building upgrades in the gaming and bar area the first two stages followed by a brand new look Bistro dining area, an expansion enticing families to enjoy our club facilities.

Where we came from...

The Wellington Soldiers Memorial Club was formed on the 29th of November 1947 when a small group of Returned Servicemen met at the School of Arts building in Swift Street with the idea of forming a Club to cater for the needs of Ex-Servicemen and their families.

The Club used the School of Arts building until 1961, when they moved into the present Club in Arthur Street.

The club has 78 years of history and continuous service to the community of Wellington (NB. there is opportunity to plan for the 80th year celebration in 2027).

In the 1990's, the upstairs disco area was very popular with the younger generation.

In the early 2000's the dining room was moved upstairs and there was Chinese food downstairs.

In 2007, the club underwent a major refurbishment and new layout. This included the upstairs foyer, the large bar upstairs as current, and an upgrade of the toilets.

In 2015, the current restaurant and the kids play area were developed.

Two smoking areas were added when the smoking laws changed approximately 15 years ago.

The revamped entrance with the covered awning was

developed 10 years ago providing comfort and protection for members as they enter and leave the club.

In 2018/19, the alfresco area to the rear of the club was developed.

The gaming smoking area was added four years ago (approx. 2019/20).

The current caterers providing Chinese and classic club food commenced with the club towards the end of 2021.

Raffles and Badge Draws have always been big on Tuesdays, Fridays and Sundays.

These nights are important for the social fabric of the town, and Bingo has always been popular for young and old.

Wellington Soldiers Memorial & Golf Group are on the verge of a major upgrade to the Club's facilities.

Recent acquisition

Last month, the club purchased the WINS land enabling further plans to be established.

During sale negotiations this club offered WINS 12 months free rent to allow the organisation to reshape its future.

To assist in this the club's General Manager Stephen Hodge was invited to become a director of WINS and later elected chair of the WINS board.

It had long been an ambition of this club's board to obtain the back section of the WINS land to build a three or four rink Bowling Green.

Now this plan can also be included.

The bowls section and rinks would be named after local sporting champions of Wellington.

The whole redevelopment is oriented towards the years to come in which the present and future young people will recognise, accept and utilise.

While looking at the downstairs area, the inside is envisaged as a sports area with plenty of room for adults and an intense play area for their children making a visit to the club a whole of family affair.

The upgrades will be introduced in stages after the main upgrades to the Gaming Room, Bar and Bistro.

First three upgrade stages

THE first stage is an enlargement of the smoking area in the gaming room area giving more privacy to players.

The second stage is a complete redesign and refit of the bar area.

The two stages are estimated to cost in the vicinity of \$2.5M.

Then a brand new kitchen and bistro style area complete with cooking at front for diners to feel part of the whole food preparation and serving process.

Menu will be enlarged to offer Australian, European and Asian cuisine.

A good steak, pizza, pasta and many other dishes..

The kitchen upgrade will be close to \$1.5million.

These are the three main upgrades which will take up to three years to complete.

Then the focus will be on the downstairs area which is planned to start in the third to fourth year.

By that time the club would have saved enough money to pay for the fourth stage.

Management has been investing funds each week, building up reserves for the construction account, which will mean the club will not have to borrow large amounts to pay for the upgrades.

With the gaming room upgrade, by giving patrons more privacy while playing, it may mean we have less gaming machines on the floor.

It is a priority that our customers are comfortable and more importantly feeling safe while in the room.

Players will also gain the benefit of staff providing a more customer-focused service out from the bar.



Future plans for Auditorium

AUDITORIUM redesign and new club main reception are the last areas in the vision.

The manager has outlined what could be achieved by turning the auditorium into a family-oriented area with a play area where families or mums and bubs and toddlers and/or locals and visitors could frequent away from club bar areas for leisurely drinks and eats while youngsters play in another nearby new play area.

The Arthur Street front of the building and current side walk-way to main entrance will become an alfresco area with bi-fold glass doors and windows facing Arthur Street and the car park, while inside the current auditorium bar will be transferred to a café counter which will serve both sides of the new area.

The new entrance will include a very large reception foyer with an escalator taking patrons up to the main floor replacing the existing stairs.

The lift will stay where it currently is.

The auditorium would be moved to above the bowling green and large enough for continued use like the present area.



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
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LAST WEEK we experienced extreme hot weather with temperatures of 37 to 42 degrees and overnight lows of 25 with very dry conditions.

Why has China introduced new tariffs on Australian beef?

In Dec 2024, China lifted a ban on two Australian beef producers, signalling the end of a four-year trade dispute between the two countries. However, when China announced new trade restrictions on Australian beef last week, concerns from both Australia and the red meat industry have been raised around whether China is plotting another trade war against Australia.

China's commerce ministry introduced a quota on beef exports, and exporters who exceed the quota will be subject to a 55 per cent tariff.

As Australian beef is protected by the China-Australia free trade agreement (ChAFTA), the commerce ministry also announced that it would pause compliance with the relevant measures in the agreement. The Tariff is set to last three years starting 1st January 2026.

Trade Minister Don Farrell said the government was disappointed by this decision calling on China to respect Australia's status as a "valued free trade agreement partner". While Australia's Red meat industry is yet to estimate the potential impacts of the tariffs, Australian exporters may be better prepared in comparison to previous trade changes.

China's most recent tariff announcement is mainly aimed at appeasing China's domestic producers. Chinese media reports dating back to 2023 found the country's red meat sector had been facing an oversupply crisis, which has led to a drastic price drop in Chinese beef. However, the overall import of beef into China has been rising, sparking concerns and complaints from China's red meat sector.

Feeder steers were firm while feeder heifers were 13c to 24c/kg dearer. Feeder steers sold from 410c to 506c while feeder heifers sold from 400c to 467c/kg.

With the season remaining very dry young cattle to the restockers were 10c to 20c cheaper with young steers selling to 510c and young heifers sold to 478c/kg.

Grown steers finished 9c to 12c cheaper while grown heifers were firm. Prime grown steers sold from 422c to 475c while heifers sold from 400c to 468c/kg.

Cows were 15c to 32c dearer with 2 and 3 scores to processors selling from 220c to 405c/kg. Prime heavy weight cows sold from 380c to 428c to average 410c/kg. Cows to restockers sold from 150c to 400c/kg. Heavy bulls sold to 396c/kg.

Dubbo Prime Lamb sale yarded 19,000.

Quality was fair with a large yarding of lightweight and trade lambs, along with good heavy lambs mixed throughout.

There were large supplies of Dorpers and limited numbers of Merino lambs. Most regular buyers were operating and the market sold cheaper.

Safety Collar cricket shirt is set to eliminate cricket related neck and head injuries and deaths

ACCORDING TO respected

Australian materials engineer and inventor Charisma Wickham, her Safety Collar invention involves the incorporation of an innovative collar into a standard cricket shirt providing critical protection to one of the most vulnerable areas of the body: the neck and lower head.

The shirt is designed to be worn by cricketers at all levels from juniors and club players to professional and international athletes to provide critical protection.

"We have helmets, pads, boxes and gloves, but the neck has remained dangerously exposed," she said.

"One ball, one bad bounce, one moment can change a life.

"This shirt is designed to help prevent that."

The Safety Collar cricket shirt looks and feels like a normal lightweight playing shirt, but the collar has been engineered to absorb and disperse the impact of a high-speed cricket ball, helping to shield the neck from serious trauma.

The protective system uses:

- * Two high-density foam tubes with hollow centres
- * A lightly padded resin backing layer

The tubes are designed to take, spread and deflect impact around the neck area.

Because the centre is hollow, the ball's force is diverted away from the body rather than directed into it.

Despite its protective performance, the collar remains lightweight and comfortable, making it suitable for regular match wear.

Prototype shirts have already been created using standard cricket shirts modified to integrate the in-built protective collar for demonstration and early testing.

"The beauty of this invention is that it's not a bulky add-on," Ms Wickham said.

"It becomes part of the garment.

"Players put their shirt on as usual and gain an extra layer of protection without having to change their routine or compromise comfort."

I REMEMBER many years ago sitting beside my son while he was deep into a first-person shooter.

To me, it looked like the usual blur of digital chaos - loud sound effects, frantic movement and enemies popping up from nowhere.

Then I noticed words appearing along the bottom of the screen.

He typed a reply without missing a beat. I asked who he was talking to. "One of my mates," he said. I asked how he knew that for sure. He shrugged and said, "Because they sound like them."

It highlighted how blurred the lines had already become.

What looked like a game was also a chat room. What sounded like a friend could just as easily have been someone else entirely. Direct messaging was a doorway through which poor behaviour, bullying or people with ulterior motives could walk straight into a child's bedroom.

Fast-forward to today and Australia's under-16 social media ban has arrived with

plenty of fanfare.

The aim is clear enough: protect young people from online grooming, cyberbullying, harmful content and algorithms that seem to know far too much about developing brains.

But while the ban has targeted familiar social platforms, gaming has largely slipped through the cracks.

Modern gaming isn't just about playing anymore. It's about chatting, streaming, trading, building virtual worlds and spending hours inside digital communities.

Many games include private messaging, voice chat and massive shared spaces where young people interact with strangers every day. In practice, the social experience of gaming can look remarkably similar to social media - just with more explosions and better graphics.

This isn't about declaring games "bad". Far from it. Gaming can be creative, social and genuinely positive.

But pretending there are no risks doesn't help anyone. Australia's only publicly funded gaming disorder clinic, based in

Perth, is already seeing hundreds of patients, many of them teenagers.

Some were gaming for 10 hours a day or more, struggling to disengage from online worlds that are expertly designed to keep them playing.

Gaming disorder is now recognised by the World Health Organisation, and Australian research suggests a small but significant percentage of children are affected.

Add direct messaging, anonymous voice chat and user-generated content into the mix and the concerns multiply.

Law enforcement agencies have warned that gaming chatrooms can be hotspots for grooming, radicalisation and exploitation. Parents often assume games are safer than social media because they look like entertainment, not communication tools.

The challenge is that gaming isn't one thing. There's a vast spectrum, from gentle creative sandboxes to platforms that are effectively ecosystems of user-made experiences, some of which are clearly not designed with children in mind.

A blunt ban doesn't make sense - but neither does ignoring the issue.

Regulation based on age-appropriate design, stronger moderation, clearer defaults for young users and better parental controls would be a start.

The government has described the social media ban as a "treatment plan", not a cure. That's probably the most honest description we'll hear.

Technology evolves too quickly for simple solutions. As social media, gaming, streaming and AI continue to merge into one always-online experience, the lines lawmakers draw today will keep being tested.

The real question isn't whether kids should game — they will. It's whether we're willing to admit that gaming is now part of the social internet, and deserves the same careful thought and safeguards.

Sitting beside my son all those years ago, I didn't see a threat - just a glimpse of a future that arrived faster than we expected.

Now that it's here, we need to decide how we deal with it.

The games provided a great opportunity for players to develop their skills while having plenty of fun on the field.


There were lots of impressive passes, strong defence and exciting tries, with coaches offering helpful tips and encouragement throughout the matches.

The girls showed great teamwork, sportsmanship and enthusiasm as they took on the friendly competition.


Wellington representative teams are now preparing to travel to Griffith and Nelson's Bay in coming weeks to compete in upcoming touch football competitions.




